# Classis Ministry Team report January 2018

Since our fall Classis meeting, the Classis Ministry Team (CMT) has met twice. Our conversations have largely focused on discerning the culture, mission, and direction of our Classis. In this context, we have given significant attention to two topics: (1) revisiting the role of CMT and (2) increasing an emphasis on discerning local ministry during our Classis meetings.

The first topic has largely been shaped by the question "what is the role of the CMT in relationship to the other ministry committees and teams in Classis?" We have received clear feedback from Classis delegates that the CMT should not serve as permission-giving body that needs to approve the work of Classis committees. We have also received feedback from Classis delegates that the CMT needs to provide some direction and assistance to committees, particularly when Classis committees are preparing presentations for Classis meetings. As a result of this feedback, we are working toward a middle-ground posture, where CMT serves Classis by helping Classis' ministry teams and committees put their best foot forward. The question we are currently asking ourselves as CMT is: How can we help the Classis ministry committees and teams thrive in their leadership within Classis Hamilton?

The second topic has also risen based on feedback from Classis delegates. Over the past year, we have heard a growing desire to have more time in Classis meetings to engage directly with our Classis ministries and to consider together some of the challenges that the churches of Classis share in common. As such, we have also spent time, since our last Classis meeting, imagining a different approach to our Classis meetings. Admittedly, we have taken some liberties in structuring the upcoming February Classis meeting to bring this local ministry focus to the forefront of the meeting. We recognize that the emphasis on praying and discerning together that we will lead in the February meeting will be a bit of an experiment for our Classis. We ask for a gracious and trusting spirit from all of you as we try a different approach in our February meeting. We will be working hard behind the scenes to make this a fruitful and encouraging time for Classis. We also invite your feedback following the Classis meeting on how to continue developing our time together as Classis.

The rest of our work as CMT can be found in our minutes, which were distributed via email earlier. We welcome your feedback, questions, and encouragement on any matters noted in those minutes.

# **Classis Hamilton Home Missions Committee Report**

January 16, 2018

Greetings to you from your Classical Home Missions Committee. As the new year begins to unfold before us, and the deep cold of winter surrounds us, we are blessed to know that the warmth of God's love is an eternal treasure worth sharing. Here is a brief summary of our activities, past, present and future.

- A. Outreach Ministry Grants Last year, four Outreach Ministry Grants were awarded to four congregations to encourage and equip them for new missional activities that would bring them into greater engagement with their communities. At the winter Classis meeting, we will be hearing a brief report from one of those churches. We will be making four more \$500 grants available in 2018, for <u>new</u> outreach ministries efforts or events, with priority given to churches that have not received them in the past. - **B.** Preparations for Church Planting With the affirmation for church planting received at the fall meeting, the committee has started having conversations, internally and externally, about some of the options and broad decisions that will need to be made. One of our goals for the first half of 2018 will be to assemble a 'discernment team' to start praying and investigating where and to whom God's Spirit might be leading us. - **C.** Have you ever tried 'canoeing the mountains'? A number of members of our team will be attending a mini-conference in Toronto on Saturday, April 21<sup>st</sup>. Hosted by the Reformed Church in America, this conference will headline Tod Bolsinger, pastor and author of *Canoeing the Mountains: Christian Leadership in Uncharted Territory.* Tod will be speaking on the challenges of leading organizations through uncharted and continually changing territory. January 2018

Let me begin my report by saying that last semester was a challenging semester, but as I sit here, reflecting on what has taken place, I feel God has both blessed our ministry and worked through it this past semester. How has it been challenging? I never felt it before, but after having taken some time off, I think I can understand how Seth felt last year. Without having to respond to tasks from the university or take on preaching assignments, worship, classis committees, Mohawk small groups and so on, he saw the strong need for a chaplain at Mohawk. Now having stepped back into this role, I can see how it would have felt. So yes, getting back up to that pace and staying on top of such a multitude of responsibilities has been challenging.

One unusual contributor to making the past semester challenging has of course been brought about by the lengthy faculty strike at Mohawk College. The strike lasted approximately five weeks and greatly disrupted our programs and our initial momentum. I would have to say that we poured more time and energy into Mohawk than we normally would have and in turn received but a fraction of our normal results. More importantly, the strike and its length cause significant anxiety among the entire student body. In short, this meant that every student we worked with was negatively affected by the strike. That said, I want to note that despite the disruption brought about by the strike at Mohawk, I think we did well. We kept things going and some new, interesting opportunities with faculty arose. I would also want to share that while I did not get the opportunity to employ, Femke, my Emerging Leader as I had originally envisioned, I think she served God and our ministry very well in a situation that called for a lot of flexibility and out of the box thinking.

Let me begin by visiting some of the issues that I addressed in my initial report. I will not go into any detail here but will try to give you a broad snap shot of how the fall unfolded.

McMaster University: Report to Associate Vice President and Dean of Students: Since I lowered myself back into the saddle at McMaster, several things have come my way via our Associate Vice President and Dean of Students, Sean Van Koughnnett. The main one has been working on a protocol committee for credentialing any potential University Chaplains. We have been meeting for approximately three hrs every second or third week since the beginning of September. This ongoing discussion has been very wide ranging and has covered everything from values, physical space issues, theological differences, Canadian culture and society, to the role of the University, while this is something that is very much needed, it is proving to be a very time consuming and intense process as we have approximately twelve to fourteen representatives of various faith traditions in attendance at every meeting.

At my recent end of semester meeting with the Dean, I shared with him my impressions of the meetings, where I thought we were making progress and the challenges we are potentially facing. I assured him that as the senior chaplain that I would continue to support the work of the committee and the University.

In addition to those discussions, we also talked about a new program I floated in the fall. This program is based on an idea I had during my trip to the Middle East. My proposal, which I tentatively call "At the City Gate" is loosely based on the ancient tradition of the elders of the city gathering at the city gate to discuss the issues of the day with the inhabitants of the city. My proposal is to create a space and place, where some of the upper administration of our university such as the President, the Dean of Student, ... (the Elders) would come and engage with the students, faculty and staff of McMaster in an open forum. The Dean was intrigued and asked me to continue to think about it and keep him informed as I begin to flesh it out. Another issue I discussed with the Dean was the upcoming 50th anniversary of our Classis Hamilton Campus Ministry. We briefly talked about some of the ways we might want to recognise and celebrate that milestone.

And finally, also regarding my position of University Chaplain, I notified the Dean that I continue to have regular office hours and that I am on hand to deal with any students that come to the Chaplaincy Centre and wish to speak to the chaplain.

Veritas: I served as the Moderator for Veritas @ McMaster this year. This year's Veritas took place over three nights. On two of those nights we had panel discussions which I Introduced and moderated. Our panelists were Dr. Andy Bannister the Director of the Solas Centre for Public Christianity, Scotland; Dr. Ronald De Sousa from the University of Toronto and Dr. Shabir Ally the President of the Islamic Information & Dawah Centre International in Toronto and the host of the television program `Let the Quran Speak.'

I preached once this semester at Immanuel CRC and accepted two more preaching requests. I am hoping through my preaching to raise some funds to cover our Emerging Leader expenses (Femke Visser Elenbaas). I asked the one church I preached at if they would take up a collection for Mohawk and I plan on asking the next two churches as well.

Whereas most of my focus has been on resuming my responsibilities with the university and our CRC ministry, I have also been meeting with my new colleagues at the Chaplaincy Centre. Our initial meetings were more about getting to know each other but more recently we have moved on to some more collaborative activities and we just recently had our first Ecumenical `Advent Chapel' together. In addition to that, I also served as a joint host at our `Chaplaincy Centre – Exam Drop in Coffee House' where we had approximately 1,000 students drop in.

Regarding our CRC Campus Ministry, my direct responsibilities are our two McMaster and Mohawk cornerstone programs - 'All Things' and 'Solid Rock' our main Fellowships. I am once again organizing the weekly fellowship speakers and as it is a dinner fellowship, I also organize the meals. We have introduced three new speakers into our Speaker's Bureau at McMaster this semester – David Kingma the Director, Finance & Administration at McMaster University and two new Alumni speakers, Dr. Matt Westerink and Derek Ellens M.Div. Candidate Calvin Seminary. As with our McMaster Faculty Mentors these three new speakers were very well received. In addition to organizing our two fellowships, my primary focus is on rebuilding, training and motivating our two leadership teams. We began the year with a two-day leadership retreat at my place. We took that time to examine our calling and exploring what we are called to do. We also spent time getting to know each other, praying for our fellow team members and training. My other main responsibilities are hosting our various ministry socials and worship times, as well as looking after our Outreach program and outdoor nature outings. Our leadership Team at McMaster the fall semester consisted of: Heather Driese, Kaitlyn Lammers, Shannon Prins, Mark Vanderleest, Eric Goforth, Joshua Hoekstra, George Zhai & Philip Driese (on co-op). We started with four leaders with the understanding that our lone male leader, Mark Vanderleest would be done at the start of December. I am happy to say that Mark ended his time as a student leader in a

very strong fashion. We are indeed thankful for his service. In preparation for Mark's departure we approached two graduate students, Eric Goforth and Joshua Hoekstra (who have long been considered roving leaders) and asked them to consider joining our leadership team. Both accepted that call and are now running our men's group - `Fully Alive.' We also called upon two former student leaders, Steven Nightingale and George Zhai and asked them if they would return and help us. Steven is now looking after our Intramural Water polo and Soccer Teams and helping with Worship and George will be helping us with Outreach.

Our McMaster Women's leadership and their duties have remained essentially unchanged. Kaitlyn Lammers and Shannon Prins are leading 'Revive Again,' our women's group and Heather Driese our senior women's leader is leading worship. To recap our McMaster University Programs: a) All Things b) Fully Alive c) Revive Again d) Intramural Teams – Water polo and Soccer e) Worship f) Outreach g) Bibles and Bowling.

Mohawk College: The one thing I would add to what I have already said about Mohawk is that one of the other ramifications of the strike has been that approximately 1000 Mohawk students have opted to drop out of their programs. For those students that were struggling a bit before the strike, I think that was a good decision. The semester was condensed and more difficult than it would normally be.

A number of these students belonged to our fellowship. Thankfully most of the students from our fellowship that dropped out have the option of starting their programs over in the January or spring semester. We had begun the year in good fashion at Mohawk and had time for one new speaker, Anne Andree-Wiebe the new Mohawk Counselor to address Solid Rock before the strike took place. When the strike began, most of our students did not come to the college and many went home or found part-time work. When it looked like the strike was not going to end quickly, I cancelled our scheduled speakers and Femke generously offered us the use of her apartment as a social meeting place. This would save the few students who might attend from crossing the picket line. Femke's apartment was small, but it worked fine for the 3-4 students who lived close to the college and were still able to meet. In addition to host some of our scaled down fellowship nights, Femke also gave a very good talk at one of the Solid Rock evenings on prayer. I felt it went very well.

Femke's role last semester was to lead our Mohawk College Bible Study with one of our new student leaders, Megan Woon. Last year it did not get off the ground and in the final report of the year the students reported that they missed it, as in its absence they only had one program in place at Mohawk – Solid Rock. Again, gathering people was very difficult and they just started to put the pieces together when the strike began. Still, they did start, and they did pick it up again after the strike ended. Their numbers were understandably small, but they ended the semester with a solid core group in place, so it is looking good for Megan and (possibly) John or Jenn to start things anew come January.

One of the things that we did in response to the strike was to deliver hot-chocolate to the faculty picket line. We did a `hot-chocolate run' every Tuesday morning and afternoon of the strike. After a couple of weeks of visiting the picket line we grew to know quite a few of the faculty by name. Megan, Femke, John and Chris were able to help me do some of the runs and I want to thank Immanuel for the use of their kitchen. Our Mohawk College Leadership Team consisted of Femke Elenbaas, Nathania Den Haan, Megan Woon, John De Gelder, Curtis Hoekstra and Chris Dekker. With the strike taking place and several of our leaders going home while it was on, we never did get a consistent leadership program in place at Mohawk this semester. There were problems with this even at the start of the semester as we were not able to find a suitable meeting time. Eventually we ended up meeting after our fellowship on Wednesday night which was not a very good time to meet. This will be one of the things I will focus on this coming semester.

Our Mohawk Programs: a) Solid Rock b) Solid Rock Bible Study. Along with bringing back, worship & the Mohawk Bible Study we also responded to the McMaster and Mohawk student's requests to bring back a couple of other joint programs. Our `Bees Initiative' for World Renew and our `Living Rock Hoodie Drive.' I have identified three things I need focus on this semester at Mohawk. Providing some consistent leadership training at Mohawk. Providing training for our Bible Study leaders and ensuring that our Mohawk Bible Study becomes more rooted. At the final meeting review, Megan indicated that she would like to try a different approach to the Bible Study. This past semester, they had employed the Swedish Method to mixed results. Further developing another joint program, we restarted this fall semester, our `Worship Song Circle.' It also came out of last years, end of year student report. The students missed coming together in worship last year and encouraged us to have it again.

So, in summary, I am very grateful for my current student leaders and my former student leaders who have come back to join me in the work of witnessing to the love and lordship of Jesus at McMaster University and Mohawk College. I am also grateful that Femke joined us in on that work this semester. She was a joy to work with. We pray for her and Anthony as they await the birth of their child. I also pray for the students, faculty, administration and staff at our two institutions, McMaster University and Mohawk College. I also thank God for you and ask for your prayers and your continued support. God bless you.

## APPENDIX #3 - CIC AND STATED CLERK'S REPORT

Following is a list of the significant items of interest from the CIC since the last Classis meeting:

- 1. There has been much correspondence with local churches regarding the calling process. It continues to be a challenge when a pastor already a minister in a church in Classis Hamilton is called to a position outside the local church, but the membership and ministerial credentials remain in the original church. Neither the Church Order, nor the Rules of Procedure address this situation. As a result both the classical counselor and the CIC need to be both flexible and pastoral, but at some point the normal paperwork needs to be in order.
- 2. Cor Visser had to resign as Reginal Disability Concerns Advocate for Classis Hamilton. Attempts have been made to fill this position to no avail until now. A request for nominees has once again been sent to the churches.
- 3. There has been some confusion regarding the interpretation of the financial support of Shalom Chaplaincy Ministry. CIC decided that the intent of classis in its October 2016 meeting was that the financial support would be reduced by 25% per year beginning in 2018. The CIC requested the bookkeeper to send out revised classical ministry share information for 2018 to the churches.
- 4. Due to a late application for financial assistance to the Classis Candidacy Committee, the CIC was asked to authorize the clerk to sign a letter of support stating that the student would be financially supported if he enrols in the M.Div. program at Calvin Theological Seminary as a full time student.
- 5. The Stated Clerk participated in a conference video meeting with all the Canadian Stated Clerks and Darren Roorda as well as Al Postma of the Burlington CRCNA office. A number of the matters raised during that meeting have been referred to the CIC and CMT for information and possible action. Of particular interest to the churches might be the following:
  - 5.1. The next National Gathering of the CRC in Canada being is planned for May 24-26, 2019 in Edmonton.
  - 5.2. The Bridge App is being rolled out Darren Roorda spoke with appreciation of the high level of participation. Churches that have not yet signed up are encouraged to do so since training sessions will begin in February.
- 6. CIC made observations regarding the employment of classis personnel, even those on a part-time or term contract since the CIC in its function as BoD has fiduciary responsibility for all employment relationships. The President of the CIC will communicate with the relevant persons and committees to ensure that necessary procedures are followed.
- 7. Given the fiduciary function of the Board of Directors of Classis and CIC's role in implementing this, CIC needs to ensure the appointment of an Advisory Panel to give advice when an accusation of abuse of any kind in local church, or classis leadership and personnel is brought forward. An Advisory Panel currently does not appear to exist in Classis Hamilton.
- 8. CIC decided that the Stated Clerk include the names of the classical counselors and the churches they serve in that capacity in each classis agenda so that each counselor will be able to give a brief verbal report about the status of the calling process. This action was taken since a number of delegates as well as counselors have observed that there is very little mutual awareness of what local churches are dealing with in the calling journey.
- 9. A request was made that CIC and classis seriously consider the two sides of denominational agencies and offices interacting with classis at its formal meetings. One aspect of such interaction is the reporting and sharing of what ministry staff is doing to further the ministry. Another aspect that does not appear to have received significant attention is the governance piece. As an example, the experience of World Renew was discussed. It presents quite a detailed report of its ministry activities for the agenda of each classis meeting. However, World Renew is owned by the churches and each classis appoints a delegate to World Renew as its governance representative. It does not appear that this governance and direction giving task of the churches through classis is taken seriously. The same observation can be made with respect to the Council of Delegates,

- Calvin Theological Seminary and Calvin College. It was agreed that this observation would be shared with the CMT to consider how this governance and direction function of classis through its delegates can be better understood and implemented.
- 10. CIC noted with appreciation that all classis churches had remitted at least 100% of their classical ministry shares for the 2017 calendar year.

There are 100s of thousands of people across the world, whose stories have been changed through the prayers, the support and the work of members of CRCs in Canada, working though World Renew. Community development, disaster response, rehabilitation, and seeking justice, as well as leadership in the global transformation movement are foundational to what World Renew does, and are foundational to your aspirations as supporters. **Thank you.** Thanks as well to the devoted World Renew board member of Classis Hamilton: Jason DeBoer (treasurer), and David Schuurman (member at large at Redeemer). They are God's gifts to World Renew.

# We also want to thank this Classis Hamilton for the loving donations of a total of \$190,586.65 from July 1, 2017 to Jan. 1, 2018, for the work of World Renew.

A. Upcoming Offering Dates

Annually, Synod recommends offerings for various CRCNA agencies. For the first half of 2018, Synod had again encouraged the churches to hold offerings for World Renew, specifically for:

**March 4:** CFGB (Canada) and DRS (US). By early or mid-February, CDN churches will receive such resources as sermon notes, a newsletter, bulletin covers/inserts, a litany and children's message notes. **April 24:** Refugees (Canada), FRB (US). By early April, CDN churches will receive or have access to print and digital resources for the church service and offering.

**June 24**: Maternal and Child Health. By late May/early June, churches will have received or have access to bulletin covers/inserts, a litany, a poster, a link to a children's video and a PPT slide for the offering. All these resources will also be accessible here: worldrenew.net/churches.

## B. Community Development: Stories of Transformation

With the help of God, James Maguma has changed the story of his family from a story of desperation to a story of hope. Joining a World Renew sponsored village savings and loan association gave him the tools he needed to make this change. James and his wife Sauja and their three daughters are one of thirty-nine households in the village of Orwadai, Uganda. Orwadai participates in a food security project supported by World Renew through the Foods Resource Bank (FRB), a Christian nonprofit based in the US that is committed to supporting farming households as they seek long-lasting solutions to hunger. James was interested.

"One day I attended a meeting in the village," James remembers, "where emphasis was made for community members to start savings groups. We organized ourselves and formed the Orwadai Farmers

Group. That was the beginning of a turnaround in my family." God gave James the wisdom he asked for and the village savings and loan association (VSLA) enabled him to use that wisdom. The Orwadai community now has their first school, a nursery school with 67 pupils. They have constructed a grass-thatched building with two classrooms and James is the director of the school.

Membership in a village savings and loan has not only benefited Orwadai village, but James'

own family as well. This year, they planted one acre of groundnuts for family income and two acres of cassava gardens for food at home. "We harvested ground nuts and it earned us 320,000 shillings (\$88), which enabled us to buy a cow for milk," James says proudly.

"Our yearly family savings from the village savings and loan association was 250,000 shillings (\$70)," he continues, "which helped us buy five bags of cement for building an additional room to our small family house. I plan to borrow money from our VSLA group to complete it. I give glory to God for what He is doing to change our story of shame to a story of glory." # C. Disaster Response

**Internationally; some programs**: *Bangladesh*: We have received approval from the World Food Program to work with them in providing complementary food assistance; to date World Renew has distributed food to over 120,000 people. This will continue in the new year. A non-food response is also being explored.

*Uganda*: Since September 2016, IDR has been working with <u>Here is Life</u>, a local Ugandan partner, to construct latrines for South Sudanese refugees who have fled conflict in their home country. This has been generously co-funded by Tear Australia. A submission to a Swiss funding agency, through Tearfund Switzerland, was approved in November for \$150,000 USD, which will allow this project to continue until at least March.

*Nigeria:* The cash assistance project for families in Nigeria displaced by Boko Haram has been extended until at least March. A proposal has also been submitted to Global Affairs Canada to expand this project and help even more families. A response to this proposal is expected in January. (See also worldrenew.net/idr)

**Domestically; some programs:** Regional managers for World Renew Disaster Response Services (DRS) have spent weeks in *Florida* and *Texas* meeting with dozens of community leaders, pastors, and various officials offering services such as building estimating, unmet needs assessments, and reconstruction services. As communities are now able to start setting their sights on the next phase of recovery,

communities are beginning to request World Renew services.

Bob Laarman, director for World Renew Disaster Response Services (DRS) traveled to *Puerto Rico* with DRS regional manager Len Blauwkamp in November. They met with potential partner organizations after Hurricane Maria made a direct hit on the island in September 2017. "We were hoping to send volunteers to help with home repairs before Christmas," said Laarman. "But once in Puerto Rico and talking with several Christian organizations,



we were asked to wait because they were not ready to host volunteers from the mainland U.S. We will continue to communicate with these organizations, and we hope to put plans in place soon to make inroads there after the new year."

"Compared to the progress of recovery in Texas, where the work is well underway, much of Puerto Rico is still in the immediate response phase of recovering from a disaster. Electrical service is sporadic, especially in rural areas. One of the days we were there, the entire Island was without power.

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In the capital, San Juan, we did not see any working traffic lights. While there, we not only visited with FEMA representatives, we also met a representative from U.S. Department of Transportation, who is also a World Renew volunteer, and the chair of Puerto Rico's chapter of Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster."

"Long-term recovery on the island will take many years, for sure. It is working with local organizations that allow us the opportunity to serve the Puerto Rican people who were affected by Hurricane Maria." (See https://worldrenew.net/domestic-disaster-0)

D. Refugee Settlement Activities in Classis Hamilton, January 1/17 to middle of December/17:

One church of this Classis welcomed refugees from Jan. 1/17 – December 19/17: Calvary CRC,

Flamborough welcomed a newcomer this year; this does not include those churches who are working with refugees currently, and/or who have applications "in the pipeline".

## E. Sea to Sea

It has been over four months since this year's *Sea to Sea* completed the 2017 transcontinental ride. The aches and pains of daily rides have gone away (at least we hope so), but what hasn't gone away is the tremendous impact that riders, volunteers, staff, and donors made with the successful 2017 event—raising \$1,683,981 (\$1,326,543 USD)!

As the proceeds are now going to work in programs and efforts to end poverty through World Renew and Partners Worldwide, it gives us a good occasion to once again express our deepest thanks to you riders, volunteers, supporters and churches. Thank you for your huge investment in time to ride, fundraise, and support Sea to Sea and its goal of cycling to end poverty.

In the spirit of "doing more strategic work with less cost", the ongoing retooling of Canadian Ministries and the pursuit of serving the local church has meant staff changes. Three names and faces that you will begin to know are:

- Alkathy Patrick who has become the new Senior Administrative Assistant replacing Dorothy Vandersteen
- Peter Elgersma who is becoming the Director of Advancement in place of Peter Noteboom (now serving with the Canadian Council of Churches)
- Meanwhile, Dorothy Vandersteen is moving to a position equivalent to the director of what was known as ServiceLink – but geared towards the direct serving of local churches, resourcing strategy for local churches and managing the roll-out of "The Bridge App". Call her!

Speaking of the roll out of "The Bridge App", the new year now sees us with 1/3 of the churches from the classes who said YES to its support intentionally onboarding! In the process of onboarding we have had a brief "Welcome webinar", looking to host 2 more in February to train church administrators exactly how to set up and run the app — and then...

we intend to put all the content together that a church will need to promote "The Bridge App" for a local church user sign up in March 2018!

Early stories are already demonstrating the Godly fruit that the Bride app can bring. One local community raised over 5000 dollars in the first month of promoting the app and its Give function.

Do not hesitate to contact the Canadian Ministries Office if you wish for your church to be signed up with the capacity to use "The Bridge App" in a unique, local, missional way!

In other Canadian CRC news, we continue to coordinate ministry and bless local congregations through a uniquely Canadian approach that has been developing over years. Examples include:

- For the first time ever, the governing board of the Canadian side of the denomination (the CRCNA-Canada Corp.) has been able to see strategic plans of each agency and ministry tied together with costs and budget with Canadian dollars
- The National Gathering for the Canadian side of the CRC has found a 2019 home. To be held in Kings University College in Edmonton, Alberta on May 24-26. Mark it on your calendars now!
- Both the New Pastors Gathering and the Youth Champions Gathering was held in January for the sole purpose of strengthening leadership connections to denominational servants within the unique challenges and opportunities within the Canadian context. This meant strengthening ties with approximately 30 key leaders
- The Burlington building and its renovation is scheduled to be complete in February. It will allow greater coordination amongst staff here in Canada
- The partnerships that the CRC has with institutions like Christian Stewardship Services, Shalem, Edu Deo and Beginnings are being nurtured so as to understand how those entities can serve our local contexts well
- There have been many changes in leadership on the Canadian side of the CRCNA. Key leaders like pastors Ron Vandenbrink, Kevin DeRaaf, Al Postma and others have joined the ranks of denominational leadership. They bring with them the wisdom and passion for the local church and an increasingly positive cultural shift of 'servanthood' around the thrust of our work.

This spring will see me attending the west coast classis meetings. I so enjoy my time with you in your regional assemblies. Having gone to all the eastern classis meetings, I am impressed with the work of so many of you and the strength you bring to your challenges. I understand both the challenge that the local church brings and the demands it places on so much of your life. ## Report to Classis Hamilton of the Christian Reformed Church: Winter 2018

This February, the Redeemer campus is honouring the faithful support of the donor community with a week-long series of events called The Gratitude Project. Donors make every year of education at Redeemer possible. Redeemer donors provided about \$3,400 of support per student last year — and that is before including gifts for specific projects and scholarship funding that donors also give generously to the university. 

# Calvin Theological Seminary Communication Points – January 2018 Update

**Commencement 2017:** May 20, 2017, was a historic day for Calvin Seminary. On that day, we honored 126 graduates (the most ever) who received diplomas recognizing their work in programs ranging from certificate programs to the Ph.D. level. Fifty-six of these students received either a Certificate in Hispanic Ministry or a Certificate in Family Counseling through our Hispanic Ministry program where all courses are taught in Spanish.

As a global seminary, we were blessed with graduates coming from the following countries and territories for our Hispanic Certificate Programs – Cuba, Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Mexico, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico and the United States.

There were 11 countries represented in our Masters and Ph.D. graduates: Brazil, Canada, China, Costa Rica, Ethiopia, Hong King, Indonesia, South Korea, Nepal, Nigeria and the United States.

**From Across the Globe:** August 21 was the date of International Student Orientation and it reflected again how Calvin Seminary is a global seminary. A sample of those students coming to enter into their program of education and formation would show students coming from Costa Rica, Korea, China, Rwanda, Brazil, Ethiopia, India, Taiwan as well as the United States and Canada. We invite prayers for these international students as well as for all other students new to CTS this year or continuing their programs of study. The formal beginning of a new academic year occurred on Wednesday, September 6, with Dr. Karin Maag marking the 142<sup>nd</sup> year of ministry service for Calvin Seminary in the context of the 500<sup>th</sup> Commemoration Anniversary of the Reformation. Dr, Maag (who also serves as editor of the Calvin Theological Journal) recently wrote the Calvin Shorts book – <u>Does the Reformation Still Matter?</u> This book has been chosen as the Book of the Semester at Calvin Seminary.

**Update on Professors:** Please join us in giving thanks for Dr. John Bolt's years of faithful service to Calvin Theological Seminary (1989-2017) as Professor of Systematic Theology.

Even as we give thanks for Professor Bolt, we also want to note three new faculty members who joined CTS at the beginning of the fall semester. Dr. Young Ahn Kang has also joined our Calvin Seminary faculty. He is serving as Visiting Professor of Philosophical Theology. Dr. Kang served for many years as Professor of Philosophy at Sogang University in Korea prior to his recent retirement.

Finally, Dr. Bob Keeley is serving as Visiting Professor of Discipleship and Faith Formation in additional to his previous work as Director of Distance Learning at Calvin Seminary. He also continues as Professor of Education at Calvin College.

**Update on Staffing:** Last fall we also welcomed Rev. Troy Bierma as a Lee S. Huizenga Distinguished Missionary in Residence as he transitions from Nepal and Rev. Jeffrey Bos as a Scholar in Residence as he transitions from Bangladesh. Both of these appointments are made with the cooperation and assistance of Resonate Global Mission.

This past summer and fall marked the beginning of ministry for a number of new persons at Calvin Seminary including: Margaret Mwenda as Chief Operating Officer and Matthew Cooke as Director of Communications and Enrollment Management.

We are blessed with looking back on a positive year for the budget of 2016-2017, but knowing that we are looking for our annual formation fund budget of needs beyond ministry shares of \$1.6 million dollars. We are deeply grateful for the faithful churches and individuals who invest their stewardship dollars in training and forming leaders for Christ's church.
